Forging ahead through Scouting Spring Camporee Camp Rotary April 12,13,14 2013

This is a list of the skill set's that the scout's and patrols need for the camporee. Refer to the Scout Handbook, field book, Merit badge books, Patrol Leaders Handbook, Knots, Lashings, Map & compass, Nature, First aid, Packing for a day hike, Cooking, Leave no trace, Tracking, Stalking, Trail Signs, Patrol Flag. All of the skills of the first 3 scout Ranks. Read your Handbook and Field Book. **BE PREPARED To Have FUN!** Note a Scout Patrol is 6 to 8 Scouts - one of the members is the patrol leader.

ALSO (4/13) Basic Adult Leadership Outdoor Orientation (BALOO) training. This is a day of fun and learning which prepares Pack Leaders to plan and carry out outdoor experiences.

A BALOO-trained leader is required for Pack Family camping.

Also given will be Hazardous Weather Training: Presents safety precautions for eight different types of weather, as well as planning, preparation, and traditional weather signs.

The activities will include BALOO the sessions, why and how of Cub Scout camping. Planning, equipment, communications, meal preparation and campfire programs.

WHERE: Spring Camporee at the Camp Rotary dining hall. (9am – 3pm)

COST: Early Bird Registration is \$5.00 per person if registered by April 5, 2013.

Registration starting April 6, 2013 will be \$10 per person.

Webelos to Boy Scout Transition

The passage from Cub Scout pack to Boy Scout troop should be smooth, with no time lost in between. By the time Webelos Scouts are ready to cross over, they and their families should be familiar and comfortable with the youth and adult leaders of the troop, their role in the troop and troop activities, and feel excited about beginning this new adventure. The Webelos Scout's graduation ceremony should clearly signify his transition to a new level of Scouting, and could include the presentation of his Arrow of Light Award, a *Boy Scout Handbook*, and or a troop neckerchief with loops.

The key factor to improved Webelos transition is the ongoing working relationship of the leaders of a Cub Scout pack and a Boy Scout troop. Ideally both the pack and the troop leaders are working together to help move Webelos Scouts into a Boy Scout troop.
