Merit Badge Counselor's

There has been numerous of non-certified people signing merit badges for scouts. Only those registered at the council are eligible to sign off on merit badges. Those signing merit badges should have some proficiency in that merit badge. Just reading the merit badge book does not make you proficient, nor does merit badge .com make you proficient. The object of the merit badge program is to get the youth out of their comfort zone and interact with other adults.

To be a merit badge counselor you must fill out a new adult application and a merit badge consular information sheet. To avoid any conflict of the unit chair signing the sheet and getting it reversed by a higher authority, please give them to
